American culture esteems people who are complex. If someone has many possessions and much wealth, is hungry to acquire more, and is savvy about protecting the wealth already acquired, our society calls such a person "industrious," "prudent," or "ambitious." Never mind that pursuit of

these things creates great anxiety. Society considers that anxiety a bonus. We call it "risk taking," and we praise the bravery of those who, despite their anxiety, dare to gobble up more resources. It is borderline fashionable to be considered a complex person in our materialistic culture. The more diversified our portfolio, the more irons we have in the fire, the more consequential we are seen as being.

Scripture rejects this portrait as being the ideal life. The Spiritual Discipline of simplicity is the Bible's alternative to everything mentioned above. Richard Foster, author of the book *Celebration of Discipline*, observes that of all the disciplines, the Spiritual Discipline of simplicity is the most visible, and hence the most subject to corruption. Simplicity is subject to the corruption of legalism, where believers commit the error of downsizing and giving away most of their wealth and possessions simply for its own sake. Once they've parted ways with their stuff, they believe they've fulfilled this discipline. Unfortunately, no change of the heart occurs with such legalism. As a result, having given away their wealth, but still deeply desirous of it, believers become conflicted and miserable. This is why simplicity must simultaneously be both an outward *and* an inward reality, as Foster notes. It starts with Jesus' plea to "seek first his kingdom and righteousness" (Matthew 6:33).

How does seeking first God's kingdom and righteousness lead to simplicity? In the praise song *Jesus, Draw me Close* we sing: "Jesus draw me close, closer Lord to you, let the world around me fade away." When we seek a right and healthy relationship with God (righteousness) and seek to embrace God's ruling style (kingdom), the natural result is that our desire for worldly wealth, status, and prestige fizzles out. With such material and emotional clutter gone, with duplicitous thinking swept away, we are freed up to be singularly focused on being a blessing to others. Yes, in most cases this amounts to taking practical steps like owning fewer things, borrowing more things, owning less expensive goods, using things until they wear out, and being creative in how to refashion old things for new purposes. And in most cases it means making our possessions available to others. But in addition to this, it also means that we become complex in a different sort of way. Our anxiety for wealth being long gone, we are free to expend more mental and emotional energy on having that prophetic-like insight into the spiritual undercurrent of all things, shifting our focus outward, and thus making our perceptions sharper and more intense. In this way, simplicity directly leads to more depth in our thinking and more consequence in our actions.

If we are guided by the Gospel and in the power of God's spirit, all of us can be witnesses in this way. I know I left the worship service that evening convicted and inspired. If you have never attended the annual Evergreen MLK service, it's definitely worth the time to check out next year!
